Program Learning Outcomes for the BA Degree with a Major in Asian Studies and a Major Concentration in Asian Language

Upon completing the BA Degree with a major in Asian Studies, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a broad historical and geographic knowledge about Asia as a transnational region.
- 2. Achieve the cultural literacy necessary for studying abroad and/ or practicing internationally-based professions by demonstrating interactional and intercultural abilities and knowledge.

Additionally, upon completing the BA Degree with a major in Asian Studies and a major concentration in Asian Language, students will be able

- 1. Communicate in an Asian language at an advanced level, as indicated by the ability to understand, converse, read, and write in that
- 2. Learn and apply various communication, critical thinking, and interpretation skills to Asian language sources.

Requirements for the BA Degree with a Major in Asian Studies and a Major **Concentration in Asian Language**

For general university requirements, see Graduation Requirements (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-policiesprocedures/graduation-requirements/). Students pursuing the BA degree with a major in Asian Studies must complete:

- · A minimum of 10 courses (30 credit hours) to satisfy major requirements.
- · A minimum of 120 credit hours to satisfy degree requirements.
- · A minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) taken at the 300-level or
- · A maximum of 2 courses (6 credit hours) from study abroad or transfer credit. For additional departmental guidelines regarding transfer credit, see the Policies tab.
- The requirements of a major concentration. When students declare the major in Asian Studies, students must additionally identify and declare one of two major concentrations, either in:
 - · Transnational Asian Studies (https://ga.rice.edu/ programs-study/departments-programs/humanities/asian-

- studies/asian-studies-ba-transnational-asian-studiesconcentration/), or
- Asian Language (p. 1).
- · Demonstration of advanced proficiency in an Asian Language.

Because of the common core requirements, it is possible for students to change their major concentration at any time, even after initially declaring the major. To do so, please contact the Office of the Registrar (registrar@rice.edu).

The courses listed below satisfy the requirements for this major. In certain instances, courses not on this official list may be substituted upon approval of the major's academic advisor or, where applicable, the department's Director of Undergraduate Studies. (Course substitutions must be formally applied and entered into Degree Works by the major's Official Certifier (https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/degreeworks/ officialcertifier/).) Students and their academic advisors should identify and clearly document the courses to be taken.

Footnotes and Additional Information

Note: University Graduation Requirements include 31 credit hours comprised of Distribution Requirements (Groups I, II, and III), FWIS, and LPAP coursework. In some instances, courses satisfying FWIS or distribution requirements may additionally meet other requirements, such as the Analyzing Diversity (AD) requirement, or some of the student's declared major, minor, or certificate requirements. Additional Credit Hours to Complete Degree Requirements include general electives, coursework completed as upper-level, residency (hours taken at Rice), and/or any other additional academic program requirements.

- Of these 9 elective courses (27 credit hours), a minimum of 2 courses (6 credit hours) and up to 5 courses (15 credit hours) may be selected from Asian Content coursework. Additionally, a minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) and up to 7 courses (21 credit hours) may be selected from Asian Language coursework (Arabic, Chinese, Japanese, or Korean). Students must complete a minimum of 3 courses (9 credit hours) from Asian Language coursework at the upper-level (at the 300-level or above).
- Students must demonstrate advanced language proficiency in an Asian language. This proficiency requirement may be demonstrated by coursework taken at the upper-level (300-level or above) or by other means. Students must complete a minimum of 3 courses (9 credit hours) from Asian Language coursework at the upper-level (at the 300-level or above). For students pursuing the Asian Language major concentration, a minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) and up to 7 courses (21 credit hours) of the 9 required elective courses (27 credit hours) may be Asian language courses (Arabic, Chinese, Japanese, or Korean). Students are encouraged to consult with a major advisor regarding this point.

Course Lists to Satisfy Requirements Elective Requirements

Students must complete a total of 9 courses (27 credit hours) from course offerings with predominantly Asian content, which can be found below. Of these 9 elective courses (27 credit hours), a minimum of 2 courses (6 credit hours) and up to 5 courses (15 credit hours) must be selected from Asian Content coursework. Additionally, a minimum of 4 courses (12 credit hours) and up to 7 courses (21 credit hours) must be selected from Asian Language coursework (Arabic, Chinese, Japanese, or Korean). Students must complete a minimum of 3 courses (9 credit hours) from Asian Language coursework at the upper-level (at the 300-level or above).

Policies for the BA Degree with a Major in Asian Studies and a Major Concentration in Asian Language

Program Restrictions and Exclusions

Students pursuing the major in Asian Studies and a major concentration in Asian Language should be aware of the following program restrictions:

- As noted in <u>Majors, Minors, and Certificates</u> (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-opportunities/majors-minors-certificates/), students may not major and minor in the same subject.
- Students pursuing the major in Asian Studies may only pursue one major concentration within the major.

Transfer Credit

For Rice University's policy regarding transfer credit, see Transfer Credit (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-policies-procedures/transfer-credit/). Some departments and programs have additional restrictions on transfer credit. Requests for transfer credit must be approved for Rice equivalency by the designated transfer credit advisor for the appropriate academic department offering the Rice equivalent course (corresponding to the subject code of the course content). The Office of Academic Advising maintains the university's official list of transfer credit advisors (https://oaa.rice.edu/advising-network/transfer-credit-advisors/) on their website: https://oaa.rice.edu. Students are encouraged to meet with the applicable transfer credit advisor as well as their academic program director when considering transfer credit possibilities.

Departmental Transfer Credit Guidelines

Students pursuing the major in Asian Studies should be aware of the following departmental transfer credit guideline:

 No more than 2 courses (6 credit hours) of transfer credit from U.S. or international universities of similar standing as Rice may apply towards the major.

Distribution Credit Information

The determination of distribution credit eligibility is done initially as part of the new course creation process (https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/courseprocess/). Additionally, as part of an annual roll call (https://registrar.rice.edu/facstaff/distribution_credit/) coordinated each Spring by the Office of the Registrar, course distribution credit eligibility is routinely reviewed and reaffirmed by the Dean's Offices of each of the academic schools.

Faculty and leadership in the academic schools are responsible for ensuring that the courses identified as distribution-credit-eligible meet the criteria as set in the General Announcements (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduation-requirements/academic-policies-procedures/graduation-requirements/#text). Students are responsible for ensuring that they meet General Announcements (https://ga.rice.edu/undergraduate-students/academic-policies-procedures/graduation-requirements/#text) by completing coursework designated as distribution-credit-eligible at the time of course registration.

Distribution courses from Asian Studies (ASIA) develop students' critical and aesthetic understanding of texts and the arts. They lead students to the analytical examination of ideas and values and introduce students to the variety of approaches and methods with which different disciplines approach intellectual problems. Additionally, they engage students with words of culture that have intellectual importance by virtue of the ideas they express, their historical influence, their mode of expression, or their critical engagement with established cultural assumptions and traditions.
